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Snake Spite-Poison
The snake which spits poison is the Egyptian spitting cobra. The mechanism of this spitting appears to be that by compression of the poison glands the venom is forced out through the fangs and at the same time a blast of air is exhaled. This carries the liquid forward as a spray for a considerable distance, and if it strikes a person in the eyes, intense irritation is set up which results in temporary and sometimes permanent blindness.

Stamps Collectors Value Old Christmas Seals

The Lake County Tuberculosis Association has recently received an article concerning the value of old Christmas seals which will be of interest to stamp collectors.

The first seal originated in the United States in 1907 when Emily Binnett used it as a means of raising money for a tuberculosis institution in her state. The 1907 seal is not valuable, however, as in the 1911 issue which was made up in rolls for use in an automatic vending machine. They are listed at \$25 in stamp catalogues.

The 1913 seals are listed at \$15 with a variation of the design in worth only half as much.

Certain designs of the years 1908 and 1912 are worth \$5 each, a design of 1910 \$2 and one of 1912 \$1 each.

Collecting of Christmas seals has grown to such an extent that collectors have formed a society known as the Christmas Seal and Charity Stamp Society. Collectors in all parts of the world belong to it.

The seal this year shows a picture of "The Little Red" first tuberculosis sanatorium established in the United States by Dr. Livingston Trudeau.

Charity offices are supported by the sale of seals which are sold before Christmas every year.
