

"College Holiday" Is Comedy Feature Sunday, Monday

"Polo Joe," "Arizona Mahoney" and "Garden of Allah" Are Headliners

Joe E. Brown's polo-playing friends will have a grand time watching the seal-roaring comedian wield a mallet from the quarter-deck of a pony in the comedy, "Polo Joe," which comes to the Catlow theatre Friday and Saturday.

Joe really has to do his stuff. One of the big scenes calls for him to swing the mallet after the fashion of a baseball bat, hit a ball flying through the air, and knock it for the winning goal.

"Knees" Gallagher is Brown's valet and deadpan comic in "Polo Joe," and the romantic interest is supplied by Carol Hughes.

They're here again—the four comedians who made such great entertainment of "The Big George Burns and Gracie Allen, Broadcast of 1937"—Jack Benny, and Martha Raye—in another melange of beauty, charm, comedy and harmony. It's titled "College Holiday," and it begins January 24 at the Catlow theatre.

Zane Grey's popular "Stairs of Sand" has been made into a hilarious motion picture titled "Arizona Mahoney," in which Joe Cook sports himself with the brand of comedy that has made of him one of America's greatest clowns.

The new film, which comes to the Catlow theatre Tuesday, Jan. 24, tells of a stranded carnival operator, played by Cook, who works out a love triangle made up of Robert Cummings, June Martel and Larry Crabbe. It is worked out mainly by an elephant and a 22-inch cannon of the type used in circuses to shoot "human bullets" into the air.

"Arizona Mahoney" is double-featured with "The Man Who Lived Twice" starring Ralph Bellamy. Glamorous blonde Mariene Dietrich and dark, romantic Charles Boyer bring one of the most exciting love teams in film history to the screen of the Catlow theatre for three days beginning January 24, as stars of "The Garden of Allah."

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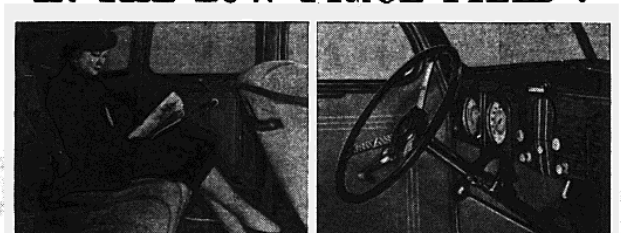

Earl DeLong States Political Theories at P.-T. A. Meeting

Predicts Growth of Federal Power As Almost Inevitable

Earl DeLong, a Barrington high school graduate, now a member of the faculty at Northwestern university, sketched the political future of the United States with the deftness of a philosopher plus the wisdom of a statesman when he addressed members and guests of the Parent-Teacher association Monday evening.

"The Constitution of the United States served so adequately because the men who drafted it were of violently conflicting beliefs," he said. "As a result, they established an elaborate system of checks and balances."

"It is highly desirable to have a method of decentralization guaranteed by the Constitution, but where shall we draw the line between the state government and its powers and the national government and its powers?" "I feel the state is in definite danger of disappearing in the course of time. Some problems call for federal solution; they gradually impose a demand for federal action. Yet I don't think a highly centralized form of government can function as effectively for us."

A short talk by Robert Muir and songs by Ho Shepard, accompanied at the piano by Donald Witterton, concluded the program and the meeting was adjourned for a social hour and refreshments.

caution to prevent the spread of the disease to their pets. The incubation period in dogs is from two weeks to four months. Several dogs were attacked by the maddened dog. It is also believed that those dogs belonged to persons living in Cuba town, ship, or north of Main street. For this reason Harold Kelsey, supervisor of the town of Cuba, has joined Chief Bland in asking full cooperation to prevent the spread of contagion.

Although the state department has not placed a general quarantine here, officials have requested owners to follow the quarantine rules for safety measures. All dogs must be confined on leashes or wires. It is also advisable to muzzle animals to prevent injury to the owners and members of their families.

The local police department will remove and kill dogs upon the request of their owners. Those persons bitten by the dog are now receiving treatment with anti-rabies toxin. For dogs that might have been bitten, a vaccination treatment can be given to prevent illness.
