

Pension List in Lake County to Be Reduced by State

Investigators will be assigned to Lake county by the state department of public welfare to reduce the list of old age pensioners now receiving benefits under the old age assistance act, it was learned this week.

The drive to reduce the number of pensioners from the present figure of 788 in the county to the maximum of 750 first estimated by the welfare department when the old age assistance act was passed is in line with the general campaign of the state department to curtail expenditures.

The state department has cut the number of pensioners from over 700 to a total of 788 for the month of May. Approximately \$15,000, or an average of \$18.25 per person, was issued to those pensioners from the combined state and federal pension funds.

The reason for the reduction was blamed on the action of children refusing to care for dependent parents. In a total of 765 awards to parents, it was pointed out, who have 1533 living children, only 51 of the 2323 children were estimated as unable to contribute to the support of their parents.

Propose to Close Stores a Half-Day in Summer Months

An attempt is to be made by merchants in Park Ridge to close all business houses on Thursday afternoons during July and August. The plan is being sponsored by the Park Ridge Business Association and, according to reports, has met with considerable success.

The purpose of the program, it was explained, was to give store employees a half day for recreation during the week at a season of the year when business as a rule is not particularly active, and at a time when a few hours spent out-of-doors in the sunshine would mean general improvement in health.

Surviving are a daughter, Miss Mabel Badenick, two sisters, Mrs. Richard Bender of Chicago and Miss Jennie Meier of Elgin, and two brothers, Mr. Meier of Barrington and George Meier of Hinckley.

Dundee Milk Herd Sets High Record

A phenomenal milk production record for three consecutive years has been set by the purebred Holstein herd owned by the A. E. Howard estate, Dundee, members of the Pure Milk association, according to Pure Milk, publication of that organization.

For the herd of 13 cows, the average has been 12,756 pounds of milk and 499.4 pounds of butterfat per cow for three years.

During the past year the members of the herd included six 2 and 3 year-old heifers; seven 4 and 5 years old and five 6 and 7 year old cows.

Figures for the individual members of the herd during the past year show two above 650 pounds of butterfat, six others over 500 pounds and eight others over 400 pounds each.

This is a high testing herd, with 11 cows from 4 to 4.5 per cent butterfat for the year and none under 2.6 per cent. The herd made a record of giving a total of 714,345 pounds of milk and 27,965.1 pounds of butterfat in three years.

According to estimates, it would take a herd of 88 cows of average

United States production to equal the average set by the Howard Holsteins for the past three years.
