Mail Notices in **Cuba Township for Delinquent Taxes**

Judgements Will Re Songht if Payments Are Not Made Within 10 Days

The first steps in the collection of delinquent personal property assessments in Cuba township were taken this week with the mailing of notices to delinquent personal owners by Justices of the Peace J. J. Claude and E. Gross.

The action is part of a drive sponsored by the county tax commission to collect \$3,500,000 real and personal property taxes for the 185 taxing bodies in the county. The lists and notices were compiled by the tax commission and forwarded to the justices. The penalty is one per cent a month, and in the instance of delinquent 1928 taxes, it amounted to \$5 per cent of the total tax.


