SCIENCE AND DEMOCRACY

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Recently Dr. Robert A. Millikan, the noted scientist, returning from Europe, said that democracy's hope lies in the application of the scientific approach to government. Commenting editorially that "there is undoubtedly a connection between democracy and science," the New York Times says:
"The freedom of thinking and inquiring which is the very essence of the scientific approach is a direct offspring of the liberty, equality and fraternity for which believers in democracy laid down their lives. Hence, the fight for democracy is the fight for science... the fight for the objective method that the fight for science...the fight for the objective method that has given us so many discoveries.

"It is no accident that neither fascism nor communism

fosters science with this detachment. Mussolini insists that a laboratory worker must be a good fascist first and a good scientist second. 
