**Sightseers From Barrington Enjoy First Ocean View**

Three young women from Barrington, the Misses Blanche Nicoll, June Jara and Esther Zepelen, had their first glimpse of the Atlantic ocean last week according to a news story in the Bay Shore Journal, Bay Shore, N. Y., published August 5. Excerpts from it are as follows:

"I bought bus tickets to New York via Niagara Falls, took their little American Youth Hostelry knap sacks and were off. To be sure there were several set-backs, such as a forgotten hotel pass, a speedy taxi trip to catch a Chicago bus at its next stop, and a friendly "joshing" of the passengers when their small knapsacks were handed out at the call for baggage at bus terminals.

The hostellers stopped off at Niagara Falls and later enjoyed the Statue of Liberty trip in New York harbor. They came to Bay Shore by train, collected their tickets which were rented from Cambridge, Mass., and cried to the farm, where Youth Hostel No. 63 is located. Two of these cycles are of English make, have three wheels and high seats, near the handle grips, and at last report were causing some concern to their young riders who had never handled this type of bicycle.

"The interest which they showed on viewing the ocean for the first time amply repaid the driver who took them to the beach Tuesday. All three went swimming, Kathy Jeppen remarking, "You really don't go swimming in the ocean—you get bathed."

"They displayed a lively curiosity about the state through which they were traveling as indicated by some of their inquiries. What were the names of the New York boroughs? How were they governed? Just why was Long Island part of New York? How long and how wide was it? Could we explain how the Great South Bay did not have any breakers?"

"They left Bay Shore Wednesday morning to take a ferry and then to East Haven, Conn., thence, by gradual stages, to Northfield, Mass."
