Distribute \$55,358 Tax Collection for Town of Barrington

Distribution of first collection of 1937 real estate and personal property taxes in the town of Barrington was started this week with checks being mailed to taxpayers of various taxing bodies. B. A. Schroeder, deputy tax collector in the town of Barrington, reported.

The checks cover \$55,358.75 collected locally before the books were returned to the county treasurer's office in Chicago last month. In addition to the amount mentioned above, more funds will be forthcoming as taxes paid in Chicago since the books were returned. This distribution is made later from the county treasurer's office.

Bind Lake Zurich Man to Grand Jury for Manslaughter

Fred Berlin Under \$5000 Bond After Hearing Friday in Collins' Death

Fred H. Berlin, 32 years old, of Lake Zurich, was released Saturday under \$5000 bond following a coroner's jury recommendation that he be held on a manslaughter charge for the death of Fred Collins, 53 years old, a former school teacher and rural mail carrier of Els township, who died on August 27.

The coroner's inquest was conducted in Waukegan Friday and the jury returned a verdict of death due to injuries received in an altercation with Berlin at Egan's Hotel in Lake Zurich on July 25. Collins died of a fractured skull which, it was charged, was caused by a blow delivered by Berlin.

Machine Skids on Northwest Highway, Two Miles From Village

Going into a side skid on wet pavement when the driver applied the brakes, a car owned and operated by David G. Loeb, 2406 Mott avenue, New York City, crashed head-on into a car driven by Frank Hinz, 5213 N. Lockwood avenue, Chicago, Wednesday morning, sending seven of the occupants of both cars to the hospital.

The crash occurred Wednesday morning on Northwest highway, two miles west of Barrington during a light rainfall. The injured were brought into the village for medical attention.

Local Young Men Are in Naval Service in Sino-Jap War Area

The fact that two young men of Barrington are now in naval service for the United States government in the danger zone of the conflict between Japan and China is a point of great significance to Mr. and Mrs. E. S. Smith and Mr. and Mrs. Leo LaPointe, all of Barrington.

Private Russell LaPointe of the United States Marines is now in Shanghai, having left Hongkong last week.

Private Eugene Smith of the United States Navy is now in the Philippines to the destroyer USS Parrott, which was among the ships sent to aid of the U. S. steamship Hoover which was bombed by Chinese airmen last week.

No recent letters have been received by either Barrington family, messages usually taking from two to three weeks for delivery. The LaPointes received a telegram from their son this week. It was sent through the war department in Washington, from the Augusta. In it he stated he was unable to write details but the situation was regarded as unfavorable. He joined the marines 20 months ago and has spent most of the time on water duty.

When interviewed, Mr. Smith stated it was probable that Mrs. Elizabeth and her eight-month-old son are still at Danvers, Calif., Philippines Islands.

Shirley Boyd, 2, Hurt in Unusual Car Crash Sunday

Auto Leaves Highway Sunday; Rams Other Car Carrying Child

Shirley Mae Boyd, two-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Boyd, 209 E. Lincoln avenue, received a severe scalp wound in an unusual accident which occurred at the Frank Graneek fruit stand, two miles southeast of Barrington on Northwest highway, Sunday morning.

She was cut about the head by flying glass when a car driven by Mr. Leo Graneek, 5802 S. Mary street, Chicago, swerved off the concrete and struck the machine in which she was a passenger.

With her at the time were her father, Charles Boyd, and Herman Leisenberg of Algonquin, owner and operator of the machine. They had driven to Mr. Graneek's place of business to purchase a watermelon and were about to enter the highway when the accident occurred.

Leisenberg's car was still 10 feet from the pavement when the Graneek car, northbound, approached on the road and then swung into it, it was reported.

Leisenberg was able to drive the car and brought Shirley to Barrington for medical attention. Four stitches were required to close the wound. She is reported resting comfortably at home. Her father received slight cuts from the flying glass and the others were not injured.

The Boyd family and Mr. Leisenberg had returned Saturday from a motor trip to southeastern Ohio where they had visited friends and relatives.

State Department Rejects Proposal to Install Lights

Chief Engineer States Court at Main-Hough Doesn't Warrant Lights

Ernest Lieberman, chief engineer of the state highway department, notified A. C. Burand, village clerk, by letter this week that his department had rejected the project designed by the village board to install traffic lights at the intersection of Main and Hough streets.

The village board had planned stop and go lights to control traffic at that intersection and to be paid for out of the state gas tax fund credited the village of Barrington.

Acting upon the suggestion of Trustee Rudolph Berg, chairman of the street committee, a project was drafted and sent to C. H. Apple, district highway engineer at Elgin, where it was approved and sent to Springfield for final consent.

In his letter, Mr. Lieberman pointed out his reason for rejection was that traffic, as determined by a traffic count, is not heavy enough to warrant lights.

Mr. Burand wrote in answer to the notice and pointed out a number of points relative to the board's action in 1935. He stated, the state highway department, through Assistant Inspector Hoff, sent to the village board a form resolution to be filed out and approved. This resolution embodied a request that permission to install lights be granted.

Inspector Hoff sent the resolution to the board shortly after traffic count was held and stated that the lights were needed due to the heavy traffic. Action was suggested to install after Main street was widened.

Mr. Burand has requested Mr. Lieberman to reconsider the matter in view of the previous action and the approval at Elgin. It is known that some individuals do not favor the proposed installation, and it has been suggested that they may have sent objections to the state department.

Mr. Lieberman in his letter stated that if the traffic count in the future warranted lights at the intersection, he would approve the resolution.

Undetermined Blaze Causes Small Loss

Fire of an undetermined origin was responsible for property damage to a small barn at the residence of Mrs. H. P. Castle, 525 Grove avenue, Monday evening. A quantity of straw was stored in the place, which formerly was used as a chicken house.
