

### Musical Hit, "New Faces of 1937," to Show Here Sunday

"Riding on Air" Billed for Monday Matinee and Evening

Night with the mutiny of out-cast men and adventure sweeping over half the world, "Slave Ship," starring Warner Baxter, Wallace Berry, Elizabeth Allan and Mickey Rooney, begins its run at the Catlow Thursday and Friday.

Ann Rogers and Gene Raymond appear in their fourth picture together in "There Goes My Girl," playing at the Catlow Saturday night.

"There Goes My Girl," is a serious dramatic presentation involving the activities of two rival reporters who are in love with each other, and the efforts of a city editor to smash their romance.

Double feature with "There Goes My Girl" is "Born Reckless," starring Rochelle Hudson, Brian Donlevy and Barton MacLane.
