

Barrington Bronchos Suffer Football Defeat at Warren Friday, 13-0

First Home Game With Grant High at Park Saturday

Blue Devils Score in First Half on Local's Errors at Gurnee

The Barrington Bronchos suffered their first defeat of the 1937 football season at the hands of the Warren Blue Devils on the Warren field in Gurnee Friday afternoon. Warren defeated the Bronchos by a score of 13 to 0.

Play favored the Blue Devils for the majority of the game and it was only in the final minutes of the game that Barrington's offensive started clicking off first downs. Using a strong passing attack, the Bronchos were able to move deep into Warren territory for the first time.

Warren scored the first touchdown in the opening minutes of the first quarter when the locals suffered a mental lapse and were guilty of very poor football strategy. With the ball on Barrington's own 37-yard line and fourth down, a plunging play was attempted which resulted in a loss of seven yards.

Zimmerman, feet Warren quarterback, started on a sweeping run around left end, cut back over tackle and faked to his left on his uncollected touchdown run. A place kick for extra point was blocked.

The Blue Devils came back in the second quarter for their second score, which was preceded by a series of line plays that put the ball on Barrington's two-yard line. Phillips plunged over for the tally and Thompson also cracked the line for the extra point.

Make Only Threat Barrington's big threat in the third quarter came after a long pass from Church to Shepard who scampered 25 yards before being brought down. The attack seemed out after that and things were quiet until the middle of the fourth quarter.

Two forward passes for 26 and 15 yards respectively moved the Bronchos down into the Warren defensive zone. Play was in that area until the closing gun.

Game Here Saturday Barrington was inflicted with three penalties during the contest, for a total of 15 yards. Warren receiving one for five yards. The Bronchos completed four out of 12 passes for a total of 66 yards, while Warren completed one out of six for 12 yards. Warren made seven first downs to Barrington's three.

The Bronchos will make their first home appearance Saturday when they play Grant township high school from Fox Lake. Grant has a strong aggregation this year, although they dropped a 3 to 0 contest to Warren the week previous.

Barrington Ponies Win and Tie in Two Contests This Week

The Barrington high school Ponies football team emerged with a 1,000 per cent standing in the two contests played at the local gridiron this week. Last Thursday they battled the Crystal Lake lights to a scoreless tie and Monday afternoon proceeded to avenge the varsity's defeat by beating the Warren lights 19 to 6.

The Warren gridgers scored their first touchdown after a few minutes of play in the first period after Barrington tacklers failed to stop them after a short pass. The ball remained in Barrington territory all of the first quarter. During the second period two new teams came in.

The Ponies first two touchdowns were scored in the second quarter on end runs by Bill Long, feet freshman half back. Long passed to Bushnell Fullerton for an extra point after the first touchdown.

At the beginning of the second half, Bob Horren, Junior quarterback, received the kickoff on the 15 yard line and raced 35 yards to

score. During the third quarter Warren was in scoring position twice but failed to score. For the remainder of the game neither Barrington nor Warren gained much ground and at the final whistle, the score read 19 to 6 in favor of the Ponies.

The golden eaglet is the highest award in scouting, and is an honor conferred by the national girl scout organization upon the girl scout whose character, physical and mental fitness, preparedness for service and spirit of good will mark her as an outstanding first class scout. Besides this she must have earned 21 proficiency badges which cover the fields of homemaking, nature, first aid, handicrafts, and citizenship.

Irene has been a girl scout for 5 years, and has applied this year for her lieutenant's commission. The first meeting of troop 2 was held on October 7 at the scout

club. This year the membership is to be larger than it has ever been, as 90 per cent of the registered girl scouts of last year returned to re-register for this coming year. Eleven new girls, who have never been scouts before, applied for membership in the troop. Because of this increase in membership, the personnel has had to be enlarged, so the troop now has a captain and three lieutenants.

A new senior patrol has been formed for girl scouts who are of second or first class rank and either juniors or seniors in high school. These girls are known as senior scouts and meet only once a month with the regular troop. Their program is to be entirely different than that of the younger girls.

The girl scouts are motoring over to Lisle, Ill. Saturday, Oct. 20, where they will inspect the Morton Arboretum and hear a talk prepared especially for them by the superintendent.
