Anybody who surmises that there can ever be an effective Farmer-Labor party in this country should ask a few farmers how they would feel if confronted with a union demand for higher wages in harvest time, on penalty of letting their crops rot: The American Federation of Labor, imitating the Committee for Industrial Organization, says it is going to organize farm workers on an industrial basis. The farmer may sometimes sympathize with labor, but not at the expense of his own pocketbook. Nobody in the world is quite so pocket-book conscious in his civic reactions as the farmer.
