"BUSINESS AND LABOR"

Robert Louis Stevenson once said that we live not by bread alone but principally by catchwords. It does seem true that in our time we are making certain words and phrases carry more weight than is good for them.

Consider the word combination: "business and labor." Almost daily we hear this phrase used as if to love one were to hate the other. We often hear about public officials "leaning toward labor" or "making overtures to business."

One need not think very deeply to understand that the interests of labor and business—that is to say, the employer—are identical; that in the long run their interests do coincide because they are both parts of the same body politic.

We need to be wary of such abstractions that set up friction between these common interests, lest the phrase turn into a battle cry.
