

Bronchos Keep Losing Streak by Dropping Game to Leyden 35 to 28

Show Improvement in 4th Conference Loss Last Tuesday

Also Beaten by Alumni Cagers in Annual Contest Here Wednesday

Although appearing to be a much improved basketball team, the Barrington Bronchos suffered their fourth straight conference defeat at Leyden last Tuesday evening. The Bronchos trailed by only four points at the half but dropped their opponents to score 16 points in the third period. These were enough to win the game. The final score was 35 to 28.

In the third quarter the Eagles had a scoring spree during which they accounted for 16 points with Witori, Eagle center, scoring eight of his 15 points. Schneider, Green, and Zuperku contributed. The Bronchos were held to four field goals, two by Watson and one each by Clings and Church. The score at the end of the third period read 32 to 20. Leyden's only scoring in the final period was a field goal by Witori and a free throw by Roulo. Clings, Herren, Watson, and Shepard put the locals' total reading up to 28. Statistics show that the Bronchos only sank six out of 15 free throws while the Eagles made good nine out of 11. Witori was high scorer for Leyden with 15 points. Clings took the honors for Barrington with 10 centers.

Alumni Win

After leading by several points until the last period, the Bronchos showed up enough to allow the Alumni to forge ahead and win by a score of 29 to 22 in the annual contest held here Wednesday night. At the beginning of the last quarter the Bronchos held a 22 to 15 lead, but failed to hold the Alumni sharpshooters, who scored seven field goals, enough to take the game. The Bronchos were held scoreless during the last period.

The Alumni used their substitutions in the first quarter and the Bronchos were able to get a ten to one lead. Then the Alumni sent in Grabenkort, Klopfenstein, Anderson, Hager, and Castle, who started dropping the counters and only trailed by a 16 to 11 score at the half. Both the teams were held in check in the third quarter and then the Alumni went out ahead. Ernie Anderson and Glen Hager shared the scoring honors for the Alumni with eight points apiece. Clings was high point man for the Bronchos with seven points.

Ponies Lose and Win

In the early game Tuesday the Leyden lights took the Ponies by a score of 38 to 28. During the contest three of the Ponies fouled out. As in the second game Leyden held the lead all through the game. Boggs, small Leyden guard, was high point man of the evening with 16 points. Grasslin accounted for eight of the Ponies 28 points and was high scorer for the Ponies. Leyden missed 17 of their 29 free shots.

Ambling Tom Smith as referee was Bill Harlow, former Big Ten scoring ace.

The Ponies defeated the Frosh-Soph in a preliminary game Wednesday night.
